CO UPK Updates


Happy Holidays from the UPK team! We hope that this season brings relaxation, love, and all things you may be wishing and hoping for!

Toddlers: Children Ages 9–18 Months Old

Growth & Learning - At this age, toddlers are starting to walk and talk. They practice communication by babbling. They understand and can respond to more words. They are likely to show preferences for their parents or other adults in their life. In fact, toddlers form powerful attachment bonds to their primary caregivers at this age. Toddlers will also begin actively exploring their environment, often putting things they find into their mouth. An important way to support a toddler's learning is to encourage them to explore their environment and practice their independence, after ensuring the environment is safe. They may also be fascinated with their peers around this age.

About this Series

The Backpack Connection Series was created by TACSEI to provide a way for teachers and parents/caregivers to work together to help young children develop social emotional skills and reduce challenging behavior. Teachers may choose to send a handout home in each child's backpack when a new strategy or skill is introduced to the class. Each Backpack Connection handout provides information that helps parents stay informed about what their child is learning at school and specific ideas on how to use the strategy or skill at home.

The Pyramid Model



The Pyramid Model is a framework that provides programs with guidance on how to promote social emotional compe-

tence in all children and design effective interventions that support young children who might have persistent challenging behavior. It also provides practices to ensure that children with social emotional delays receive intentional teaching. Programs that implement the Pyramid Model are eager to work together with families to meet every child's individualized learning and support needs. How to Use Visual Schedules to Help Your Child Understand Expectations

Adults often use calendars, grocery lists, and "to do" lists to help complete tasks and enhance memory. Children as young as 12 months can also benefit from these kinds of tools and reminders. Often, children do not respond to adult requests because they don't actually understand what is expected of them. When a child doesn't understand what he or she is supposed to do and an adult expects to see action, the result is often challenging behavior such as tantrums, crying or aggressive behavior. A child is more likely to be successful when he is told specifically what he should do rather than what he should not do. A visual (photographs,




pictures, charts, etc.) can help to communicate expectations to young children and avoid challenging behavior. Unlike verbal instructions, a visual provides the child with a symbol that helps the child to see and understand words, ideas, and expectations. Perhaps best of all, a visual schedule keeps the focus on the task at hand and negotiation about tasks is not provided as an option.

Visual schedules (activity steps through pictures) can be used at home to teach routines such as getting ready for school. These types of schedules teach children what is expected of them and reminds them what they should be doing.

When you create a visual schedule, the CHILD should be able to use the schedule to answer the following questions: (1) What am I supposed to be doing? (2) How do I know that I am making progress? (3) How do I know when I am done? (4) What will happen next?

📵 Try This at Home





- Allow your child to remove the photo of an activity once the activity is done. We all loving checking things off our list!
- Choose a difficult time of day (i.e. getting ready for school, bedtime, etc.) to begin.
 Once it becomes routine, you can easily expand the visual schedule to include your entire day.



Visual schedules are used to show a clear beginning, middle and end. Visuals empower children to become independent and encourage participation. At school, visual schedules can be used to show a daily routine, a sequence of activities to be completed or the steps in an activity. Visuals can also help a child remember classroom rules or other expectations without adult reminders.

The Bottom Line

Visual schedules can bring you and your child closer together, reduce power struggles and give your child confidence and a sense of control. Visual schedules greatly limit the amount of "no's" and behavior corrections you need to give throughout the day, since your child can better predict what should happen next.



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Parents as Teachers - How Young Children Approach Learning

How Young Children Approach Learning

Parents often think their first baby is a genius. They aren't completely wrong. Any adult who learned as much as quickly and as well as an infant would almost have to be a genius.

Babies are incredible natural learners, masters of gathering and applying new information. The aspects of how they approach learning can be thought of in three clusters:

- 1. To begin
- 2. To stay in
- 3. To dig deep and expand out

All of the learning approaches are so natural to babies that a large part of parents' job is to just not get in the way. That can be challenging because infants' early communication, motor, and social abilities are so tiny that parents might not notice their child's earliest attempts to

communicate or realize that she is trying to move her arm in an early attempt to touch something interesting.

Parents and caregivers who are sensitive to intent on the part of an infant – who can notice that the child is interested, trying to move, or trying to communicate and who can help that infant reach goals, or see what she is trying to see, or get what she wants – are on the path to raising a child who is a capable learner thrilled by the process of learning.

Newborns come into the world with extremely limited abilities to do anything, and within three years they will have mastered the basics of moving around the world (locomotion), of socially connecting with the people in their world, of using successful strategies to solve problems, and of speaking whatever language or languages are being used around them. Each infant has taken in vast amounts of information and transformed herself from a baby who could eat, cry, sleep, and barely control her own gaze to a toddler who can run, jump, speak, get people's attention in many ways, and communicate her wants, needs, thoughts, and emotions.

They learn many other things and, depending on their culture



Virtual ITERS-3 training will be held on January 23rd & 24th, from 9-1 pm. Virtual ECERS-3 will be held on February 27th & 28th, same time, and virtual FCCERS-3 will be held on March 5th & 6th, from 9-1 pm as well.

These trainings will allow for observation, scoring, and supporting teachers with environmental ratings. The Council Coaches currently offer these services through Ms. Monique Bosch and possibly a new coach in the coming year, however, we want to extend this training to you as well.

Please note that after you complete the training, you will incur

the costs for bringing Clayton here to observe and certify you. The annual average cost to sustain certification is approximately \$800-\$1000. 
